Two Scenarios

Scenario 1: Tendayi is a seven-year-old girl living in Mbare, a high-density area of Harare, Zimbabwe. She lives in a one-room cabin with her widowed mother and four siblings. Her mother works as a vendor selling vegetables at the market near the bus terminus. Her meagre income is barely sufficient to provide food for the family but does not stretch to school fees for the children. So Tendayi carries a heavy basket of fruit on her head and competes with the other vendors while helping her mother. An NGO (Non-Governmental Organisation) agrees to pay school fees for one of the children and her brother is chosen, as boys usually get preference when there is an opportunity for education. It is almost inevitable that Tendayi and her sisters will marry young and fall prey to the on-going pattern of poverty and inequality.

Scenario 2: Emily is a seven-year-old girl living in the suburbs of an Irish city. Her mother is also a widow and like Tendayi, Emily has one brother and three sisters. Her mother is in receipt of Social Welfare payments which enable her to provide for her family. Education is free and books and transport are provided for those who cannot afford them. Emily is involved in some extra-curricular activities such as music and sports. She has every opportunity to make the most of her situation and if she works hard, she will have a career and be able to choose what she wants in life.



The stories above illustrate the difference between opportunities that are available in rich and poorer countries.

Equality and non-discrimination has long been a cornerstone principle of international human rights law. Tackling inequalities (of opportunity and outcome) and discrimination (direct and indirect), is crucial to move towards the full realization of human rights.

Extreme economic inequality is causing growing public outrage around the world. According to the OECD, income inequality is at its highest level for the past half century. The average income of the richest 10% of the population is about nine times that of the poorest 10% across the OECD countries, up from seven times 25 years ago. Inequality is closely linked with challenges such as poverty, environmental degradation, persistent unemployment, political instability, violence and conflict. Several factors - economic, social, cultural and institutional, need to be tackled to promote more inclusive progress for those who have been left behind.

Word of God: James 2: 1 – 9

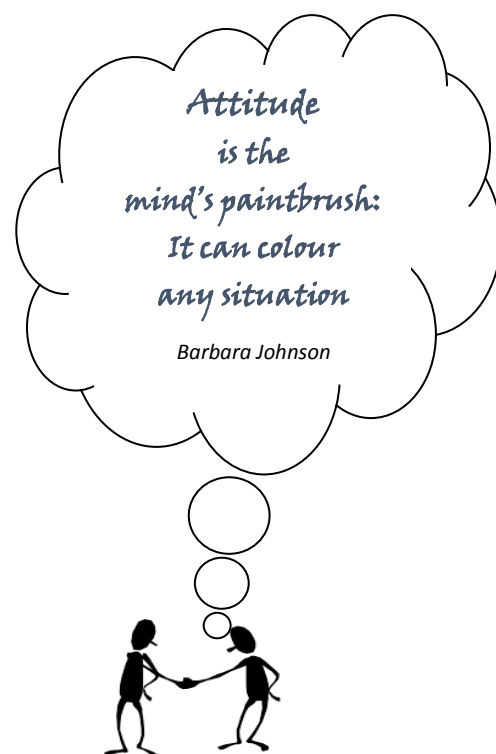
Questions for reflection and sharing:
